Paolo and Jonathan are regular supporters of YMS and their visits are



always an inspiration to our guitar pupils – and their teacher!
The violinists were treated to an afternoon with Anthony Marwood following his stirring performance with duo partner Aleksandar Madžar in The Menuhin Hall the previous evening.

The bassists were thrilled to welcome back Paul Ellison who was visiting us from The Shepherd School of Music at Rice University in Houston, Texas.



## Out and about

A busy calendar of concerts saw the pupils performing to audiences from all walks of life. Chamber music was to the fore as several venues had no piano. The first of these concerts was at the beautiful Hartsfield Manor in Betchworth where the Arensky Quartet and the Hermann Violin Trio were preceded by solo guitar for an audience of invited guests. The Arensky ensemble (Kingsley, Selina, Natasha, Özgür) had a second outing later in the week when they performed at the Banstead Arts Festival; another quartet joined them

encompassed the usual three short concerts on one night and a longer concert the following night. A new venue for the School was Sarasins, our asset management

company next to St Paul's Cathedral; Richard, Claire, Emili and Duru gave stunning performances alongside the spectacular view of Wren's dome from the balcony.

The last week of term was another busy one with the Summer Festival, but the pupils found time to perform at a concert arranged by Surrey County Council Chairman Tony Samuels at the Council Chamber in Kingston in joint support of Reigate and Banstead Women's Aid and our own Student Hardship Fund.

#### BBC Radio 3's In Tune

At the beginning of term a long-planned project came to fruition with performances of both of Chopin's *Piano Concerti* by alumnus Emmanuel Despax with a quintet of string players from the School. Originally the plan was for a Founder's Day concert only, but Emmanuel then arranged for an additional performance at the home of Bob Boas who hosts many chamber concerts for audiences of friends and contacts.

Serendipity struck when Emmanuel was invited to appear on Radio 3's *In Tune.* As Bob Boas lives just round the corner from the BBC, Emmanuel

suggested performing a movement from one of the concertos. Things did not run so smoothly in practice however! Just as the ensemble (Mira, Ezo, Darwin, Pere and Daniil) were about to set up for rehearsal the fire alarm went off - so everyone had to leave their instruments and walk down eight flights of stairs to the pavement outside while the alarm was investigated. A couple of fire engines went past....and Tom Service, who was presenting the show, was whisked off to the far reaches of the Radio 2 studios in order to begin the broadcast. 5pm came and went (they had been due to play at 5.10) and at last the



ensemble was given permission to re-enter the building. However they had to quickly climb the eight flights back to the studio, and had 10 minutes in which to tune and do a very short balance test before they were on air! In spite of the less-than-ideal preparation, their performance was described as 'magical', and Tom Service was very full of praise when they had finished.

On the 27 June we held one of our largest scale events of the year with nearly 600 children coming to two concerts in The Menuhin Hall. They listened to our pupils play a varied set of works as Elliott Perks narrated their journey through music, culminating in a heart-warming performance of Oscar Perks' setting of 'London's Burning' with the chorus of children accompanied by the YMS Junior Orchestra. Nowawdays the dear, elderly Steinway lives in the 'ballroom' at Blair Castle (where we give two performances) and we stay at Lavinia's home - beautiful views, wonderful walks, fantastic food and warmest friends.

Our first performance of the tour is now in Berwick on the English/Scottish

border - a lovely old town. The next day a lunchtime concert in Eyemouth with fishing boats in the canal outside, then the train to the Western side of Scotland to play in the very special New Lanark. What a wonderful set of new friends we have there.

Back to Edinburgh to perform in the beautiful Canongate Kirk - a glorious setting for a concert. Even I look up to the windows and feel refreshed. And finally, the two concerts at Blair Atholl.

It is still predominantly a pianists' tour but we 'magnanimously' allow one violinist, one cellist and one guitarist to come too! I hope this will continue forever. It is such an experience and a privilege for our young musicians - in life, and in music.

#### **Junior Citizens Event at Walton Fire Station**



In June, the Juniors greatly enjoyed the Elmbridge Junior Citizens safety event. Coordinated by Child Safety Media, with assistance from Surrey Police, Surrey Fire and Rescue Service, Elmbridge Borough Council, St John Ambulance, South Western Rail, Amey British Transport Police and the RNLI, the educational safety scheme teaches children how to stay out of danger in everyday situations.

The pupils were taken through a series of interactive lessons which taught them a variety of skills, including basic first aid, water safety, railway safety, stranger danger, waste and recycling and fire safety. The scenarios were designed to challenge children and make them think for themselves, hopefully giving them the tools they need to make good decisions in difficult situations.

The Juniors reported that it was very interesting and a great reminder of how to prevent and avoid danger.

### **Brackenbury Art Exhibition**

It is no secret that our pupils are creative but one might be forgiven for assuming that this creativity is purely musical. Anyone lucky enough to experience this year's Brackenbury Art Exhibition - held during our Summer Festival in the Kentner Room and organised by art teacher Patsy Belmonte - will testify that our pupils' talent and imagination extends to the fine arts as well.

Alongside traditional paintings and sketches, there were wonderful sculptures, mobiles and a Zulu shield. This year there was also a huge installation inside a tent, complete with film, photographic collage and handmade tiles created by pupils and staff - all carefully curated by Natasha.

Another group of 15 left at the crack of dawn for a day trip to Bruges. They


experienced a rich cultural adventure and thoroughly enjoyed their time in mainland Europe.

contribution to classical music over the course of her career. Earlier this year, she announced her retirement from the concert platform to focus on other interests including giving masterclasses, participating in juries for competitions and advancing the effort to ensure music remains a vital component of the national curriculum.

The Marmen Quartet (including alumni Ricky Gore on violin and Steffan Morris on cello) won the Grand Prize in the Bordeaux International String Quartet Competition. The prize includes a three-year international tour.

Andrew Samarasekara led a performance of the world premiere of *Gammified* for string quartet and electronics – by the composer Tod Machover. The perfomance at MIT opened the BrainMind Summit conference to an audience of the world's top neurological scientists presenting their latest breakthroughs.

Jacob Shaw's Scandinavian Cello School has just released a short film which gives a flavour of a day in the life of the school. It is available to watch on their Facebook page.

**Bella Tang** won the Concerto Prize at the Ealing Concerto Competition, and will perform as a soloist with the Ealing Symphony Orchestra at St Barnabas next year.

We hope that this will mean that everyone in our community - from Friends, to staff and parents - has the chance to experience this wondefully special event.


Even with the extra concert it will be very busy, so please book your tickets early to avoid disappointment!

# **Nearly there!**

In our Spring newsletter we shared our need to reach an ambitious target of £1.235 million by the end of August in order to provide the best possible educational experience to our pupils, and support the 90% of students who would not be able to attend the School without some level of financial assistance.

# Did you know...

## ...that we have 65 pianos across the School?



From concert grands in performance spaces, to our fleet of teaching instruments in the Music Studios, and upright practice pianos in (almost!) every room in the boarding houses, pianos play a huge part in the dayto-day life of our pupils. Our students need constant access to highquality pianos which must be kept in top-condition - meaning frequent tuning, repairs, and replacements. Piano tuners recommend tuning a piano once every six months when it is situated in a home, let alone instruments in daily use by musicians in training!

In September we are launching an extensive piano overhaul programme to ensure that all of our pupils have access to instruments of the quality that they require. On top of servicing and repairs, we estimate that we will need to replace a minimum of three upright pianos every year over the next five years to ensure that our practice pianos are of an acceptable standard.

At this point, we need to raise at least £38,000 for tuning and servicing our pianos, and an additional £10,000 to kick-start a rolling programme of piano replacements. This will ensure that our pupils have the instruments that they need to help them reach their potential.

This lovely wee family member was one of the most delightful and engaging of people. Never a bad or a demeaning word could be heard from her; instead you were always left with the impression of her strong sense of loyalty and correctness. Dropping in to take her out somewhere

or just to chat was never greeted with anything but delight.

The gentleness Nanette possessed should not overshadow her capabilities and sense of focus - for years she filed her own tax returns. Nanette had that strong Scottish Presbyterian ethic, where there was only a right and just way of doing

For once her Scottish instinct to always spend wisely did not interfere with that little hardship! Her business acumen and judgement seemed to stem from

a real attention to detail. Nanette and her sister Helen, who passed away several years ago, were part of a close knit little group, and never forgot their Scottish heritage. Within the family we discovered that her pet name was "squirrel". We realised this sobriquet fitted her quite well when faced with the unenviable task of going through all the "squirrel's" paperwork!

For Nanette the company and pleasure of her cousin's grandchildren was something she really enjoyed. One quality of Nanette's that will always be remembered was her wry sense of humour. Never a person occasioned to use bad language: even a "damn" was abhorrent to her. That said she was heard to personally blame someone for interrupting her planned TV viewing schedules when the 2016 Football World Cup was being televised. During those four weeks she was constantly heard saying: "you and your bloody football are ruining my TV programmes". The only slight reprieve was that on her 90th birthday that same innocent presented her a coffee mug inscribed with the words: "I Love Bloody Football".
